SIGMA TAU DELTA



Dave Stevens, head football coach, is a graduate and former athlete of Southeastern. He came to Southeastern in 1941 and has a very impressive record behind him.

Coach Stevens' Savages have won three conference plays since 1946 and have finished second three times.

In the past six years he has won 38 games, lost 19, and fied 4. Coach Stevens also serves as track coach.

Although the Savages have not won a track crown in the past six years, they finished second in 1947, 1948, and 1949.

They were nosed out by OBU in 1947 by two points and again in 1948 by $\frac{1}{3}$ point.

The 1951 Savages finished the season with six losses and only three victories but those who watched them play know that the team was much better than their record indicated.

The Savage schedule was perhaps the roughest one ever faced by a Southeastern team. Coach Dave Stevens' crew lost to such out-of-state powers as Louisiana Tech. Northeast Louisiana, Austin College, and Carswell Air Force of Fort Worth.

Carswell's team was made up entirely of major college football players including two All-Americans, Bud McFadin and Bud Sherrod, and six other players who had gained recognition on the All-Southwest conference team.

In conference play the Savages finished in a tie with Southwestern for second place. Against conference teams they scored 94 points and only 48 were scored against them.

The highlight of the season for the Stevensmen was their 30-7 victory over East Central. The Southwestern Homecoming game, won by the Savages 33-6, rated a close second.


Although the team won only three of nine games they proved themselves worthy with their fight, hustle, and sportsmanship.

Coach Sullivan has proved himself one of the best small college coaches in the nation. His record for the past twenty years at Southeastern is an amazing one.

He is the only coach ever to win the Oklahoma Collegiate conference in basketball for five consecutive years. Coach Sullivan's ball-control and defensive type basketball has spread throughout the state and neighboring states.

Coach Sullivan is also line coach for the football team and coaches the baseball team.


As the Year Book went to press, Southeastern's highly efficient Savages were in first place in the Oklahoma Collegiate Conference, with seven victories and no defeats.

The 1951-52 cagers of Coach Sullivan had defeated every member of the OCC and seemed headed for another conference title. Their season's record showed fifteen wins and only five defeats. They won the consolation championship in the Sunshine Tournament at Portales, New Mexico. Immediately afterward, they won nine consecutive games.

This Savage team is ranked as one of the school's best. Its roster lists eight graduating seniors and a host of underclassmen who more than live up to the high standards demanded by Sullivan-coached teams.

It would be almost impossible to name the team's most valuable player, as they all shared in the glory at one time or another. The most enjoyable victory of the season was the Savages' 56-40 conquest of arch-rival East Central of Ada. It was the most lopsided game between these two teams in the past eight years.

Southeastern was far ahead of the conference in defense with a 45.4 average.






Top left: Ken Drummonds (85) scores as the Savages deflated East Central Tigers 56-40. Other Savage pictured is Don Parham (38) under goal.




Bottom left: John Gecks (88) pivots off the post for a field goal in the Phillips University game. Watching from the front line is Kenneth Drummonds (85).


Clarence Dyer, Savage tennis coach, has enjoyed great success with his teams here at Southeastern. His netmen won the Oklahoma Collegiate conference in 1947, finished second in 1948, and won the crown again in 1949, 1950, and 1951.

Coach Dyer, who is also Associate Professor of Industrial Arts, has brought much honor and distinction to Southeastern State College.

Perhaps the least recognized, yet most successful, sport on Southeastern's campus is tennis.

At the present time, the Savage netmen have gone through thirty-three consecutive duel matches without a single defeat. In 1951, they tied Texas A&M and SMU and defeated Houston University, Missouri Valley champ, TCU and Oklahoma University's big seven champions.

Since 1947, they have won the Oklahoma Collegiate conference four times and finished second once. In last year's conference tournament the Savages were completely dominant. Harlowe Binning, Savage number one man, defeated another Savage, Rick Green, to win the OCC singles championship. Green and Binning teamed together and defeated teammates Bruce Blake and Kenneth Lewis for the doubles championship.
