





A Step In The Right Direction














Projects of the new 18 members group for the year included the VIVA Exhibition II and lecture-demonstrations by Father Walsh and George Calvert.




Fellowship Of Christian Women

SEA activities for the year included a membership drive and a big-brother and sister program. Students taped books for the blind and held numerous programs centered around education.






Membership is limited to junior and senior women with high scholastic average and leadership qualities, as well as Christian character.

Serving as advisor to Cardinal Key is Katie Frank Slack, Dean of Women.







Photography Club






President's Club Discuss College Problems

Delta Chi sponsored a float in the homecoming parade which they titled "Cage the Rangers," and they also participated in the Greek Bowl.



Editor of the 1971 Savage is Linda Bell. She is assisted by Larry White, and a staff of five students.




The OCC championship award was brought to Southeastern State College in a 2 of 3 series against Phillips University.




To help administer these new courses, three new faculty members have been employed for the teaching of the Aviation curriculum.







The department hosted the annual High School Speech Tournament, Savage Tournament for colleges and universities and a one-act play festival for high schools in this district.






A landmark in the history of Southeastern State College's library was reached during the 1970-71 school year when the 100,000 book was added to the collection.




Computer Science

The department is anticipating the purchase of an IBM computer. Jim O'Steen serves the department as chairman.







Home Economics

There are 70 majors currently enrolled in home economics for the 1970-71 academic year. Individual and special counseling for all majors is provided in an effort to determine the program which best meets the needs, interest and abilities of the students. The B.S. Degree is designed for pre-professional training for careers in nursing, dietetics, consumer problems and fashion merchandising.

A highlight of the department each year is the President's Banquet for Oklahoma Education Association delegates and guests, planned, prepared and served by the meal management class, with the art department providing the decorations.

The home economics department continues to keep up-todate in helping to meet current social problems as evidenced by participation in projects involved in training the high school drop-out, food service supervisors, Head-Start supervisors in Indian Service, preparing Special Teachers for working with disadvantaged groups, and currently, an adult class of 18 women, employed in cafeterias, nursing homes, and small hospitals receiving additional institutional training. Upon satisfactory completion of the 90 hour course and some work experience, they qualify for certified Food Service Supervisors.





TTT Program

The Oklahoma-Texas Triple-T Project is a federally supported program for training both teachers and supervisors for public schools and also the people who train teachers and supervisors, such as college faculty members — Triple-T stands for "Training the teachers of teachers." The project is in its second year; it is expected to continue for three more years.

The emphasis of the progect is on devising innovative programs and teaching techniques to attack current educational problems, particularly for ethnic minorities such as Blacks, Chicanoses, and Indians. Its shaping principle of operation is the cooperation of community, public schools, and colleges and universities in planning training programs.

Dr. Eugene E. Slaughter is Coordinator of the project, Claude Adams is Associate Coordinator. Subdirectors are Dr. Henry Gold, Dr. Joseph E. Littlejohn, Dr. Jack L. Robinson, and Dr. G. Pat Powers. These personnel manage the five main components of the project:

- (1) the community advisory committee,
- (2) the Experienced Teacher Fellowship Program for the Supervisors and other trainers of Elementary School Teachers of Reading,
- (3) The Doctoral Intern Program in Elementary Education,
- (4) The Experienced Teacher Fellowship Program in Elementary School Counseling, and
- (5) The freshman and sophomore programs in elementary education.
