Progress Marks 59th Year

Southeastern State is on the move! President Leon Hibbs is in his second year as chief administrator. The field of computer science offers a minor for the first time while the number of aviation majors is increasing in the program's third year.

The campus face receives a new look with the creation of another entrance and groundbreaking for a nine-story coeducational dormitory adds to the progress.

Formation of a girls' drill team, the Savage Anns, and chartering of local chapters of three national organizations show growth in student activities.

Despite the changing times, tradition is preserved. Enrollment lines are as long as ever, special dates break the monotony of routine, sports events draw large audiences, and students continue to feel that the days are never long enough to do the many things college life demands.



Improvements Benefit Students

Clubs Offer Talent Outlets

Various types of organizations are found at Southeastern. From social organizations to special interest clubs—more than 50 groups provide opportunities for active effort on the part of the student.

The Art Club sponsors the Beaux Arts Ball, an all-school costume dance where organizations compete for the best exhibits that depict the selected theme. Individual students vie for the best murals in two divisions—realistic and stylized.

Honor groups play an important part in recognition of outstanding students. Blue Key for men and Cardinal Key for women honor high standing upperclassmen by membership. Several national societies select top students.

Interested students work during the year on the college's two publications.

Events Spark Student Life

Activities abound on the campus. All-college events, such as picnics, dances and assemblies benefit the student body. Individuals also branch out into interest fields such as campus government and choral groups.

Playing an important part in college events are the stage and music performances. Summer drama involves community people as well as college students. SSC's chapter of Alpha Psi Omega, dramatics fraternity, aids in production.

Savage Scandals, student-directed varsity show, features various forms of talent and is presented each year. A tradition in Scandals is the girls' chorus line. Also featured in Scandals are various playlets centered around a theme.

Special opportunities for coeds are provided by the girls' drill team, band majorettes and cheerleaders.

SSC Adds To Curriculum

Additions to the curriculum include computer science being offered as a minor field of study and a Bachelor of Science degree in technology. The bachelor's degree contains several choices of specialization, as well as two-year technology certificate programs.

Aviation boosts include acquisition of two additional planes and improvement of facilities at the airport.

Faculty-student organizations enhance educational processes.

New faculty members totaled 14, while four were on leave for advanced study. Others continue to undertake travel, research and summer study.

Sports Programs Provide Variety

Serving as an important part in the school's program of education are the athletic activities and competitive sports for men and women.

SSC offers not only varsity teams but also a sound curriculum of classroom instruction and courses designed to develop the physical abilities of students. Inter-collegiate teams are basketball, football, baseball, tennis, track and golf, while college courses range from women's gymnastics to dancing.

While the new designation has brought innovations, without de-emphasizing liberal arts offerings, the college has actually been a "community college" in the broadest sense, since its founding. Bands and choruses, "Town and Gown" drama activities, library and audio-visual services are among the many Southeastern programs which have had significant impact on the community through the years.



Preparation Lasts All Night



Students and faculty shared many of the same concerns from parking meters to academic maturity.


The meeting was sponsored by the President's Club with president Leon Hibbs as faculty sponsor. President of the club is Doug Weldon.


Drama Firsts Highlight Year


Aviation

Program Grows In Third Year

American Flyer's aviation degree program completed its third year of progress with numerous students pursuing the study. Southeastern's responsibilities in the aviation program are general education, ground school and basic flying at Eaker Airport.







Baptist Student Union won a third place award in the Homecoming field decorations. The organization is a campus church group available to all students six days a week.


BSU participated in statewide Baptist functions and is a leader in campus intramurals.

Catholics Host Italian Dinner


Roman Catholic faith is represented on campus by the Newman Club. After being inactive for a period of years, the group held a spaghetti dinner during December.

Featured with the Chorale is the Men's Quartet which also sings for local organizations and banquets.





Music Students Select Twirlers


High point of the year for Music Educators National Conference was a twirling contest for high school students held during Homecoming.



State Convention Draws Members


Attending the state convention in Oklahoma City highlighted the year for Phi Beta Lambda, national business fraternity.


Western Meet Tops Events



The organization, based on interest in educational developments and


progress, sent representatives to both fall and spring state conventions.







Phi Sigs—Tony Benson and Jerry Campbell represented the organization in the Inter-fraternity Council. Benson served as president of the council.





Other activities included the White





'Loss Streak' Dampens Spirit

With seven returning senior squad members, five of which were main starters, the Savages were in hopes of avenging their '68 record. Their hopes turned out to be only anticipation as, one by one, they dropped conference games.

An early loss came in the Pre-Season Oklahoma Collegiate Conference Tournament. James Bowers, in his second year as head coach, had hoped for a repeat performance as tourney winner; but the Tigers of East Central ripped the Savages 79-68. In a consolation game, the Blue and Gold slipped by Panhandle 73-70.

In SSC's first conference game, the Oklahoma Baptist Bison squeezed by Southeastern 68-67. Ten straight defeats followed, eight of which were conference games.

The "defeat spell" was finally broken when the Savages beat East Central 45-43; but the Northeastern Redmen gave the Savages another conference loss 63-57. Conference col-

leges Phillips, Langston and Panhandle decided to "dump" the Savages again. SSC finally came back with a win over Northwestern 70-65.

Back-to-back conference defeats at the hands of Central and Southwestern put the Savage overall record at five wins and 18 losses.

Ending a disappointing year the Blue and Gold gave home fans a victory over Oklahoma Baptist University, the team that had given SSC its first conference loss.

The Savages dropped 15 conference games by an average of less than 10 points per game. At the end of season play Southeastern stood last in the field of nine conference colleges. Ironically enough, the league leader was Southwestern, the team the Savages had beaten in their first OCC tilt 76-67.

The Blue and Gold ended a disappointing year with an overall record of six wins and 19 losses. Last year's seasonal record was 10-15.



Defeats Characterize Season

Led by center Jim Christianelli's 41 points, SSC jumped out to a quick lead and never trailed.

JONESBORO, ARK., Dec. 3—SSC's record dropped as Arkansas Southern defeated the Bowers' Boys 92-73. Christianelli's 39 points and Donnie Keck's 10 paced the Savages.

SHAWNEE, Dec. 7—Suffering a one-point loss 68-67, the Savages dropped their first conference game to the Bison of Oklahoma Baptist.

DURANT, Dec. 13—SSC suffered their second conference loss by one point. Phillips University slipped by Southeastern 55-54.

DURANT, Dec. 14—After losing two consecutive games by one point, the Savages lost their third in overtime. The Langston Lions bested the Savages 98-91.

Regulation time ended in an 82-82 tie. In overtime, the Lions outshot the Savages 19-16.

TAHLEQUAH, Dec. 17—Sparked by four players in double figures, the defending OCC champion Northeastern dropped SSC its third conference loss 86-72.

Held to six points in the first half SSC's Christianelli roared back with a 16-point final half outburst, but it wasn't quite enough.

LAKE CHARLES, LA., Dec. 27-28—SSC dropped a pair of 10 point losses in the McNeese Christmas Tournament.



The team boasted a 22-8 over-all winning record and a conference record of 15-3.

Six baseballers—Danny Hubbell, Jim Godsby, Robert Drew, Jerry Hulme, Gary Clements, and Trent Baulch—received conference honors.

Gary Clements led the team in stolen bases and the number one hitter was Trent Baulch with a .384 average. He had 33 hits and 23 runs batted in.

Baulch received the Bloomer Sullivan Award for top athlete.

Pitcher Danny Hubbell had an overall record of 8-1 and led the team in strikeouts with 46.

PLANO, TEXAS, March 16—Southeastern's baseball team started

the season on a winning note, taking a doubleheader from Plano University, 3-0 and 14-1.

Southpaw Danny Hubbell pitched the strong two-hit shutout in the opener.

DURANT, March 23—SSC dropped a pair of close games to powerful Phillips University on a muddy field, 2-4 and 2-5.

DURANT, March 27—In the first conference game of the season, SSC dropped pre-season favorite Northeastern 4-3 and 5-3. With all other conference teams losing, SSC took the lead in the OCC standings.

SHAWNEE, April 10—Oklahoma Baptist shelled the Savages in a twinbill 9-0 and 16-1 to drop SSC back into tie for the OCC lead. The Savages managed only one run and eight hits against Bison pitching.

ADA, April 27—Southeastern's sixth and seventh straight wins, this time over the East Central Tigers 7-0 and 5-0 enabled them to regain the OCC lead as OBU lost.

DURANT, April 30—The OBU Bison invaded Durant hopeful of taking the lead in the OCC. OBU nipped the Savages 2-1 in the opener to tie the two teams for the conference lead, but SSC came back in the second game to win 4-2 and regain the top.

DURANT, May 4—Affording no more losses in conference play, the Savages all but cinched the OCC championship by defeating the East Central Tigers 3-1 and 8-5.

Second baseman Mike Metheny had four hits including one home run.

DURANT, May 8—SSC socked Langston 9-0 and 8-2 and wrapped up the OCC championship for the first time in the college's history. SSC won the eastern half of the conference playoff and faced the much-dreaded Phillips University.

DURANT, May 13—After rain had delayed the playoff for over nine days, the sun finally came out long enough to let the game begin.

Gary Clement's double in the bottom of the ninth inning moved pitcher Danny Hubbell for the winning run as SSC defeated favored Phillips University 2-1 in the first game of the OCC playoffs. SSC's other run came on Mike Metheny's single in the second inning.

DURANT, May 14—The Savages shocked the state by knocking off the Haymakers the following day by the same margin of 2-1 to capture the Oklahoma Collegiate Conference.

The tension-filled game was climaxed by Trent Baulch's winning run coming at approximately the same time that the sun stopped shining and a downpour fell on the Savage diamond. The Savages ahead 2-1 earned the trip to the regional tournament at St. Joseph, Mo.

ST. JOSEPH, MO., May 25—SSC dropped a close 2-1 decision to the eventual champion William Jewell College of Missouri in the opening round of the regional tournament.

Southeastern was out of the regional running; but had won the Oklahoma conference, and had set a precedent for the 1969 team.



Netters Compile 8-0 Record

Winning the eighth straight Oklahoma Collegiate conference with a perfect 8-0 loop record was only one of the many highlights of the 1967-68 tennis season.

Additional honors were second place in the doubles bracket in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics tournament at Kansas City, and having the top singles conference champion.

and James Wadley made it all the way to the finals before bowing to Redlands College of California. SS had upset the top seeded Pasadena State for the chance at the final.

Jay Lysaught captured the OC singles championship after taking the runner-up spot last year.

Lysaught and freshman team member Dwight Nuckolls ended the season with a tie for top singles honor with identical records of 18-6.


