






### Activities









The brothers never seemed to tire of playing god natured "mind games" with their friends. What became apparent was a strong sense of mischief, and a neve ending love for the attention given and the confuse caused by their unusual fraternal set-up.

An easy affection seems obvious between then they're all given to ribbing one another. Clint, for a ample, described how simple it was to tell them apar "Dave's the smart one, I'm the good-looking one, an Scott's just the 'other one'," he deadpanned.

Their first names are actually Clinton, Trenton, an Brenton, but the triplets opted to go by middle name to eliminate confusion.

Laughingly, they evaded questions about 'switchin in classes. "That would be telling!"

As for switching on dates, they answered true form, "You never know . . ."

Their triplet status gets them into some strang scrapes here on the SOSU campus. "Constantly, peop come up and say 'How are you?', 'What'd you do

class?' and we have no idea who they are," explained Clint. "We just play along, and say we don't remember or whatew then tell 'em gotta go!"

"We made one person mad," laughed Scott. "They came into class the next day, and they said, 'I kept calling you, and y never would turn around and talk to me!" One lady said one day she saw one of us at the Bookstore, one of us at Administ tion, and one in the Fine Arts Building. She said she thought, 'Golly, this person walks and changes clothes so quick!"

He continued, "Dr. Wester was our math teacher here, and me and Clint were sitting in class and he was asking name and majors and he came to me and Clint, and said 'Oh, we have twins, everybody! Ya'll are identical twins, aren't you and we said, 'No, really we're not.' And he said 'How is that?' And we said 'We're triplets!' He thought we were be sarcastic, until about three weeks later Dave came to meet us there at class. Dr. Wester was out in the hall talking to Dave—thought he was one of us, and me and Clint came around the corner. Dr. Wester's jaw hit the floor! He had to get the ent staff to come look at us."

The Horners have a colorful family history.

The triplets have three older sisters (not triplets). However, of course they had to spend some time on the leg-pulli claiming that their sisters were the "famed" Easter triplets from Bennington.

There is some history of multiple births on both sides of the family.

Family memories include one major scare for Dave.

"We were going to get our driver's licenses, and we had our birth certificates out," remembered Dave. "We were look at them, since we'd never seen them before, and each has a thumbprint and a footprint. I said, 'Mom, my thumbprint does match my thumb!"

Continuing the definition of life as a triplet, "I guess it's like having a brother that can't beat up on you, and you can't heat up on him," described Clint, referring to their similarity in size.

According to the twins, they have never really been able to fight with one another.

"We can't do that," said Scott. "It'll be like, 'Clint, I hate you!' Then, 'Can you buy me something to eat?" "No, there's never been any real trouble," agreed Clint. "We just get mad and say how we feel, and that's it.

"Me and Scott may have occasionally scuffled," he explained. "But we've always stepped back and gone, Whoa!' because we never want it to go any further. We never hit Dave, because he won't hit back and it's no fun!"

Scott explained further what it's like to be a triplet: "It's like having someone that, when they put your clothes on, you

He followed this amusing aspect of "tripletness" with an anecdote: "I was driving the pickup, and one of us has to sit in the middle, you know? The mirror was propped half crooked. "Most people tell us they're afraid to come up and bother us, and say, 'I know you probably hate this, but . . .' It never bothers us, though," said Scott. "I guess we grew up having all this attention, and we always liked it." "Attention, girls," stressed Clint into the interview microphone.

"So here we were looking at the birth certificates, and she was telling us this story, and I was thinking, 'I'm not who I

thought I was!'

"She said, 'You must not be Dave . . .' I was scared to death, until she laughed and admitted, 'Oh, that's my certificate anyway!' About had a heart attack."

One often hears stories of a strange "affinity" between twins or triplets, such as the ability of one to feel pain when

another is hurt. According to the Horners, this isn't noticeably the case.

"There're a lot of times when we'll say the exact same thing at the same time," said Clint, "but we don't know what each other are thinking."

"We don't do anything like 'feel each other's pain' either," added Dave.

Clint mentioned, "We went to a triplets convention in Oklahoma City one time and talked to some other triplets. Some of them do feel that way. Some for example, if their sister's been in an accident, will think, 'My sister's been hurt!' or something. But then again, we've never been through anything serious like that together, so we don't know anyway. But as for feeling each other's pain, we've not really been aware of it.

Clint and Scott labeled Dave as the shy one of the three.

Scott joked that Dave's driving is terrible. "Well, he's not so bad now, but when he first was learning, boy, look out! He was passing on a hill one time, and almost got run over by a truck."

Scott and Dave claim that if one of them, is teased by the others most often, it's Dave. Perhaps the order of birth explains this, with Clint born first, then Scott, then Dave.

The Horner brothers had plenty of stories about going through school in triplicate.

"We dressed alike until about junior high," said Dave. "We just never thought about it before then. It was maybe the first day of junior high when our English teacher said 'Why don't you start dressing like individuals?' and we said, 'Now's there's an idea!' But then that same teacher would call us by saying, 'Hey, triple, come here.' Individuals, huh?"

One surprise in the triplets' past was their history in high school theatre. According to Clint's account, it consisted of the

"three kings of orient" - every year.

Another anecdote: "In high school," said Scott, "when we'd play other schools, me and Clint would get on the court, and the other team would sit there and argue, 'I'm guarding him!," 'No, I'm guarding him!' One time, Clint fouled out and I got thrown out of the game!"

"That was fine with me," responded Clint, grinning. "I just kept on playing!"

All three of the triplets work part-time. Scott works at the SOSU concession stand at games and at Price's Printing here in town. Dave can be seen here at the Campus Bookstore in the afternoons this semester. Clint also works on campus, at the motor pool division of Campus Security, as well as at Durant's Super H.

Each has a different major; Scott is majoring in business administration; Dave's major is biology/chemistry (with pre-med intentions). Clint, when asked, said he is majoring in "Girls 101 and 102!" Really, his major is business, banking and finance

### Age 94, Violinist and Auditing Student Loves to Learn

Hat in hand, Southeastern student Glen Halik can often be seen resolutely crossing the campus on his way to class.

Mr. Halik is one of many over traditional age SOSU students, with one difference; Halik has been a lifelong student for 94 years.

Halik, whose passion is music, joined the student body last semester and this semester is auditing Dr. Robert McFadden's History of Music class, and Dr. James Wintle's sophomore level Music Theory and Literature.

At the age of five, Glen Halik first picked up the violin and began to play.

At age six, his father discovered he had the gift of absolute pitch (the ability to accurately sing or recognize a note without the aid of an instrument).

Halik then discovered a lasting love for music.

Talking to this reservior of homespun opinions, knowledge, and observation, it is startling to reflect that this very present, persistent SOSU student saw the start of World War I, was alive when silent movies gave way to "talkies," watched the Great Depression ravage this nation, and has seen 18 presidents come and go in his lifetime before Bush's administration today.

These facts seem incongruous when one meets the man who today offers private violin lessons, animatedly attends and soaks up his classes, and proudly still drives himself around town in his own car.

To supplement the interview he granted, he provided a simple manila folder of his own treasured faded photos and reviews, which revealed a handsome young man who gracefully cradled his voice of expression, the violin. His collection of praise-filled reviews from old programs of his musical concerts are in themselves a nostalgic peek at simpler days.

Their quaintness doesn't disguise their impressive message, however-Mr. Halik has done his share of playing with some fine orchestras of his day.

Some of the teachers under whom he studied were well respected within the music world, Leopold Auer and Leon Sametini among them.

He is a graduate of the Wisconsin School of Music and the Chicago Musical College.

He did a year of graduate work at the Institute of Musical Art (affiliated with Juilliard), and at various times has taken directed studies under at least eighteen widely-known musician/instructors.

His musical career has taken him to Michigan, Wisconsin, California, and Chicago in Illinois, as a teacher, concert-master (filling the prestigious first chair of the violin section), and performer in various orchestras.

Now, Glen Halik has had to concede that the violin can wear heavy.

With his characteristically tenacious humor, he jokes about arthritis, which forced him to cut down on his prolific violin-playing. "I'm an arthritic violinist," he smiles, "I play around all the joints."

His arthritis has left him unable even to make a fist, and to play his violin he must rest it on a nearby piano.

Halik's eyes are weakening, and he wears hearing aids in both ears. "I like to tell people I have 'AIDS'," he grinned, "and watch them react."

Halik also says his absolute pitch has "dropped a whole step" due to the wear of his years.

His thirst to stay on the go makes him impatient with the forced slow-down of old age. "This getting old . . ." he observed. "Browning said the last of life is the best. Some of us just don't agree.

Halik, as well as others in their later years, are wasted in forced retirement, he says. "I have much to offer in the field of teaching. I love to teach; I wish I had more students."

Education has been almost a hobby for Glen Halik, "I've taken classes and audited all my life. While teacher I took classes. It's fun!

"I'm still weak in the area of theory. I could take classes for the rest of my life in that area," he said.

Halik moved here from Las Vegas, Nevada at the same time as his adopted daughter and her husband, who live mile west of Albany.

They moved to Oklahoma to purchase land for their labbit business because, as Halik explains, "There's no market for rabbits in Nevada."

He was widowed in 1982. According to Halik, who still keenly feels his wife's death, she died from high blood pressure and multiple strokes.

His sense of humor intact despite his loss, Halik jokes, "We met in a harmony class; we always said we were esolving discord ever since!"

Glen Halik's opinion of contemporary music is low. "Today's music has broken away from form. People who are only interested in the emotions of music don't lways appreciate the other side.

"Those who've had training can appreciate it more.
"I'm in favor of experimentation, but music should be thing of beauty. The repetition in rock and jazz seems rimitive or savage to me. I like more variety."

However, Halik enjoys modern compositions written by Dr. Wintle, whose theory class Halik audits. "His music is interesting," observed Halik. "Much of modern music dissonant, which I don't like.

"In Wintle's compositions, there is variety within each biece. He's a tremendous pianist.

### Students react to news of

When the first reports of anti-aircraft tracer fire in Baghdad entered the living rooms of Americans watching the Jan. 16 evening news reports, SOSU students experienced reactions that ranged from shock to jubilation to anger.

Within an hour after the president's official announcement of Operation Desert Storm, groups of students gathered in the Coffee Shop to watch the big screen television for the steady stream of updated information. Some were quiet and expressionless, watching the screen from a distance; others gathered at tables near the screen, ate, and loudly commented on the reports of Baghdad's bombing with a mood almost of celebration.

One group of debate team students working late in the Fine Arts Building compiled stacks of research material in front of

a television while quietly discussing the possibility of a draft.

A student working a shift at KHIB student radio station took down news updates telephoned from Station Director Keith Varner to broadcast over the air.

In those first few hours after the bombng, the news was welcomed by some students.

"About time," said Troy Barnett, who sat watching television in SOSU's Baptist Student Union.

"We made a good choice in waiting until early morning their time," he observed.

"As for a draft, this is not supposed to be like another Vietnam, so there probably won't be a draft, but if they do, I'll go." Edith Canaday, who sat in the Wesley Center watching news updates while her two daughters played nearby, was worried but said she was behind the president's choice.

"I support the president in what he's done, and I support Operation Desert Storm. I'm sorry it had to happen, but I still

support him.

"I hope that our péople will soon be home, though," said Canaday, who has a brother on active duty in Saudi Arabia, Millie Allen, one of the debaters working late in the Fine Arts Building when the news hit, said she was worried about her

family, especially her mother, whose work is directly related to Operation Desert Storm.

"I'm worried about my friends," she said, "the people I know who are already over there."

Steve Johnson expects to be called up for active duty by the end of the month, and says he is worried.

With his seat pulled up directly in front of the Coffee Shop television, Johnson talked with his somewhat more boisterous friends, but kept an attentive eye on the reports.

"We're probably going to lose a lot of people," he said

"The people around us are taking this too lightly. Their attitude is too happy about what's happening, a 'gather 'round the flag' kind of thing," Johnson said.

"This will probably last a lot longer than most people think, maybe even a year," he predicted.

Other students expressed ambivalence about the purpose of the war.

"It sucks," Shannon McCraw said bluntly. "The whole thing does. There's going to be a chain reaction.

"However, it's not going to be another Vietnam," he amended. "I think it will probably be over soon.

"Anyway, now is not the time to protest. Now that they're in there, let's just get them in and get them out."

Bradley Biebuyck, who was entering the Coffee Shop where people clustered to watch the reports of early bombings, kept his comment simple: "I'm getting my bell bottoms out and I'm going to wear them. And my candle is lit."

### Operation Desert Storm

The continuous news coverage persisted through Thursday, and the early persisted through of initial U.S. victory above expectations.

Despite the good news, many classes appeared thinner than usual.

Professors in political science classes supplemented their course material with discussion of Operation Desert Storm.

Other instructors dismissed classes altogether because of the crisis.

However, the director of the campus Wesley Center, Alex Costea, said he had a different impression of the campus atmosphere.

He said he noticed a mood of, "I'm in Southeastern Oklahoma, so what? It's just another day."

"I don't think many students realize the full implications of what's going on," said Costea.

He added that those students who have been activated in the military will face tough times becoming readjusted to life in the states.

"Just think of how it is when you've been gone for a weekend. You come home and the house just doesn't fit right! Think how much worse it's going to be for these soldiers.

"There's going to be that kind of personal upheaval," he said.

As a Vietnam veteran, Costea feels he may be more keenly aware of war than many students, but added, "You'd think with people knowing this many people who are over there, there'd be more concern."

The campus displayed symbols of politics and emotion that took several forms.

The Morrison Building front lawn trees were liberally decorated with yellow ribbons to show concern for Operation Desert Storm soldiers.

Yellow ribbons also showed up on classroom doors, jacket lapels and car antennas.

One student combined the yellow ribbon with an American flag on his

"Kick His-, George!," someone shoe polished onto the back window of a black sports car.

"Peace, please," urged a canvas banner draped over the Wesley Center's permanent sign.

And in contrast with nearby windows sporting Greek slogans, a derogative "No Camel Jockeys" slogan, accompanied by a slashed-through camel, adorned a window in Choctaw Tower facing out over the tennis court.

The Persian Gulf War continues with new complications: threatened linkage with the Arab-Israel issue began with Iraqi bombings of Tel Aviv and Haifa in Israel, and Israel is discussing plans to retaliate, which could tangle the loyalties of the Arabic coalition members.

President Bush is calling up as many as 200,000 new reserve troops, which tould mean that he thinks the U.S. will need to settle in for the duration.

Support for the military action overall has stayed high in the U.S. this week, while a smaller sector continues to attract attention through public demonstrations

One large poorly-timed protest was set up in front of the White House while the president whisked off to the Camp David retreat for the weekend.

Southeastern has quieted down somewhat after a week.

Students are realizing that Operation Desert Storm, right or wrong, may take quite a while.

### SOSU Teacher with Army honors dies at 57 by Colleen McGraw Editor

Col. Gary C. Williams, 57, who joined the faculty at SOSU after 30 years of military service, died Dec. 24 at his home

At the time of his death he was teaching Business Finance and Marketing courses.

Williams is survived by his wife Patsy Kuykendall Williams, who told The Southeastern he "loved this place."

"He felt the atmosphere was unmatched at any other place he'd seen. He really felt this campus was warm and lovi and the faculty was outstanding here. He fit right in," she said.

"He was a Christian man; he lived the way he believed. We're really going to miss him."

After a service Dec. 26 in the First Christian Church of Marietta, where Col. Williams resided, he was buried in Arling National Cemetery in Virginia.

Col. Williams was a graduate of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y. and saw combat in the Korean Con

and the Vietnam War.

As an Infantry officer he held multiple assignments in Vietnam as a Battalion and Regimental Advisor, Separate Brig Intelligence Office, and commander of a U.S. Mechanized Infantry Battalion.

Following his last tour of duty in Vietnam he became Deputy Commander of the Third Infantry, known as the Old Gu

the Army Ceremonial and Honor Guard Unit in Washington, D.C.

He was the Army's Chief of Protocol during the nation's Bicentennial planning and celebration activities.

Col. Williams served as Command Center Operations Chief in the National Military Command Center, and as Command of the Army School of the Americas in Panama.

Four years prior to his retirement he worked for the Joint Chiefs of Staff, where he was responsible for monitoring

Western Hemisphere including Central and South America.

He also was Crisis Action Team Chief responsible for planning and monitoring the Grenada Rescue Operation and Libyan Bombing Operation.

Col. Williams held numerous military qualifications including Airborne, Jumpmaster, Ranger, Pathfinder and Aerial

He was a graduate of the Command and General Staff School, the Industrial College of the Armed Forces, National S

rity Management Course, the Naval War College and the Army War College.

Among his many decorations were the Defense Superior Service Medal, two awards of the Legion of Merit, three Bro Stars, the Purple Heart, the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, three Army Meritorious Service Medals, 11 Air Medals, Combat Infantryman, Joint Service Staff and Army Staff Badges, and numerous foreign decorations including the namese Cross of Gallantry and the Medal of Honor, First Class.

He was married of Feb. 14, 1989, in Marietta to Patsy Kuykendall.

Also surviving are sons Gary C. Williams, Jr. of Falls Church Va., and John Williams of Radford Va.; stepsons K Kuykendall, Georgetown, Texas; Brent Kuykendall of Helsinborg, Sweden; and Karl Kuykendall, Lewisville, Texas; five step-grandchildren.

He was an active member of Marietta's First Christian Church.










